Kitten Care and Vaccines Protocol

New kittens require a lot of things; from food and treats to toys and bedding, so those first days at home are very busy. After picking a name, the next thing you should do is see your veterinarian for a wellness check and start vaccinations.

At 6-8 weeks of age, kittens get several sets of vaccines every 3-4 weeks until fully vaccinated for the year. Kittens are tested for Feline Leukemia and Feline Immunodeficiency Virus on the initial visit. These conditions could be present from birth and have the potential to be contagious to other cats. Each series should include a deworming to ensure standard kitten worms are treated. Kittens are not given the Rabies vaccine until after 12 weeks of age.

A kitten is not protected against dangerous factors in the outside environment until they are fully vaccinated. Until this time, we do not recommend taking your pet out of its home and yard environment unless given approval by a veterinarian. Below is the normal kitten vaccination protocol. This protocol may be modified by the veterinarian due to age or size of your pet.

First Visit (6-8 weeks) - Date
